STEWARDSHIP DEVOTION - God Calls Us to be His Workers

In spite of our foolish and sinful ways, God calls us to be His workers. Scripture tells us that Jesus did not pick people from society's elite when He chose his workers. Jesus' disciples were peasants, fishermen, and even a tax collector. Paul wrote, "Brothers, think of what you were when you were called. Not many of you were wise by human standards; not many were influential; not many were of noble birth. But God chose the foolish things of the world to shame the wise; God chose the weak things of the world to shame the strong. He chose the lowly things of this world and the despised things . . ." (1 Corinthians 1:26-28). The majority of God's work was done and continues to be done by the lowly and oppressed people.

Certainly, God can use celebrities and very successful people in His work. However, we need to remember that, even though we may not have accomplished anything of worldly significance, broken any records, or won any awards, God can use and transform us into effective workers in His kingdom. "I can do everything through Him Who gives me strength" (Philippians 4:13). Society gives many accolades to those who succeed, but there is no greater honor or privilege than to be chosen as God's vehicle to spread the Gospel. As John states in his Gospel, it is Jesus Who does the choosing. "You did not choose Me, but I chose you and appointed you to go and bear fruit" (John 15:16).

So why does God elevate the foolish and the lowly to be His workers? A reason may be found in 1 Corinthians 1:29: "so that no one may boast before Him." It is only by God's grace that we are saved, called, and equipped to be in His service. If we come into God's work with impressive credentials, we risk taking the glory and credit for ourselves. God desires the weak and the lowly. As Paul said, "Therefore, I will honor all the more gladly about my weaknesses, so that Christ's power may rest on me. That is why, for Christ's sake, I delight in weaknesses, in insults, in hardships, in persecutions, in difficulties. For when I am weak, then I am strong" (2 Corinthians 12:9-10). God uses ordinary people to do extra-ordinary things. Are you ready for duty?

FOOD FOR THOUGHT

Here's a healthy habit:

Post-Convocation Reflections

Friends and Co-Laborers in Christ, we consider it a blessed privilege to have been able to meet, share and fellowship with so many of you at our recent Black Ministry Family Convocation. We sincerely pray that our keynote presentation raised the questions and concerns and pointed to the resources that will help you to enrich and extend your ministries. We want to take a moment to reiterate a few critical points and to leave you with some suggestions for action in your congregations and ministries.

First, we want to clarify who we, the Black Ministry Think Tank, are. Just like each of you, we are called and authorized servants of our Almighty God! We have no official capacity in the Synod or in our respective districts, but we are concerned members of the LCMS who want to see our church body as a whole, as well as our individual ministries and congregations, become more and more effective in our outreach to African-Americans, African immigrants and other people of color. The Black Ministry Think Tank did not come into being to DO ministry but rather to alert our entire church to areas of ministry that need our attention. We suggest ministry ideas and strategies that the Think Tank develops but we also seek to share ministry ideas and strategies that we learn of from you!

The Church all over the world is operating in a very challenging environment; but our Lord Jesus made clear that the Church will prevail--no matter what the circumstances. It's helpful to know, however, the circumstances in which we operate. Attached to this message are:

- Some statistical information on church closings within the LCMS, the current number of Black professional church workers and the prognosis for the short-term future; and
- Survey results taken at the convocation on how people view their ministry and ministry needs.

We also offer the following suggestions for enhancing your ministries. Most of these were shared at the Convocation by us or by other presenters. A number of these suggestions relate to youth ministry which was the focus of the Convocation. We offer those first:

HAVE A YOUTH DEDICATION CEREMONY in your worship service on some appointed Sunday. Just as pastors surround and lay hands on a pastor who is being ordained, have the youth (no matter how few) come up to the altar and have the elders or church council or all parents lay hands on them as a biblical charge is given them (like the words Paul spoke to Timothy) so that youth can appreciate how special and important they are in the ministry. (This was done at the Convocation and it was quite impressive!

HAVE JUNIOR LEADERS: Appoint youth to serve as junior deacons, junior elders and junior church officers who partner with and learn from the adults who hold those positions. (Youth who are actively involved in the ministry are less likely to drift away.)

Consider using the same concept in the congregation with career choices. If you have teachers, accountants, lawyers, electricians, plumbers etc. in your congregation, see if there are youth who might be interested in those career choices and develop adult-youth partnerships. (Youth who feel "connected" to fellow church members are less likely to drift away.)

MAKE EVERY FIFTH SUNDAY A YOUTH SUNDAY! (Did you use to do that? Bring it back!) Have a Sunday where youth are responsible for EVERYTHING: Sunday School, the church bulletin, the sermon, the choir—everything! Offer needed assistance but encourage their creativity with careful low-key guidance.

Other Suggestions:

CONSIDER THE VARIETY OF MUSIC USED IN YOUR WORSHIP CELEBRATIONS: A mix of contemporary and traditional seems to be practical (and preferred according to our survey!) Our hymns are a learning opportunity but if we don't understand (OR don't pay attention to) what we are singing, then we are not worshipping "in spirit and in truth"!

HAVE AN ANNUAL BLACK MINISTRY CELEBRATION during which we share and celebrate the history of Black Lutherans in the LCMS. This can be a great learning opportunity for Blacks and Whites that might help us to better appreciate one another. Information on that history is available from the LCMS. Check the Black Ministry tab on the LCMS website.

DELIBERATELY AND CONSISTENTLY CULTIVATE AN"AMBASSADOR MENTALITY" among your members. Far too many of our members tend to support their churches with their presence and maybe even their dollars but consider the *work* of ministry the job of the pastor and a cadre of elected or appointed leaders OR projects or programs that happen in a church building. Encourage EVERY member to recognize and embrace his or her role as a full-time ambassador of Jesus Christ in their homes, on their jobs and in their neighborhoods through sermons, classes, prayer circles or even a special stewardship event.

CAPITALIZE THE LETTER "B" IN BLACK when using the term as a racial designation. The Associated Press changed its policy two years ago and is now using uppercase B when referring to Blacks in new stories. The LCMS has not yet changed its policy and we encourage you to encourage them to do so; but in the meantime, please use an uppercase B in black when using the term as a racial designation in

your personal and church communications. Interestingly, the Associated Press has NOT changed its policy with respect to using an uppercase W when using White as a racial designation; but there is no reason why we, the Church, cannot lead the world instead of following it!

INITIATE CONVERSATIONS ON RACISM in your congregation and/or circuit perhaps focusing on local or national incidents. Understandably it is likely to be uncomfortable initially; however, as the body of Christ, we have a unique opportunity to change hearts and outlooks with the Word and love of God. We should never underestimate the critical difference we can make in the world around us!

Consider starting a discussion group on the controversial Critical Race Theory with the goal of understanding what it is and proposes. An excellent starting point might be engaging a group to read CRITICAL RACE THEORY: AN INTRODUCTION by Richard Delgado and Jean Stefanic. Have weekly discussion groups chapter by chapter and see what you discover.

ESTABLISH AN ACTION TEAM! From all reports, Convocation registrants had a blessed and productive time! But don't just leave it at that! Establish an action team in your congregation or circuit. Share the information and ideas that you took away from the Convocation with others and start developing plans to eliminate or enhance existing ministries and to initiate new ones. Perhaps there is a ministry idea on which two or more congregations might collaborate. Use an action team to get the ball rolling!
